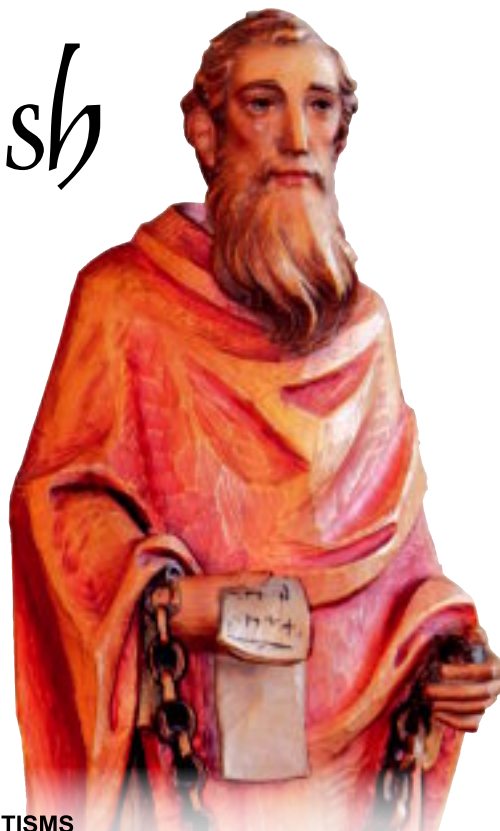

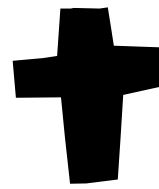

Are We Worth Our Salt?

Several years ago, one of the books on the *New York Times* bestseller list was called simply *Salt: A World History*. The author, Mark Kurlansky, traced the importance of this simple chemical compound in ways that the average person sprinkling salt at the dinner table would never imagine.

We take salt for granted in our day and age. Sometimes we even see it as a health hazard. People with high blood pressure and other diseases know the dangers of too much sodium in their diets. Anyone living in cold climates in this month of February knows the blessing and curse of the salt that melts

the snow and ice but at the same time leaves a thin, white film over cars and roads and shoes.

And yet, in today's Gospel, Jesus uses the phrase "salt of the earth" to refer to his followers. In his day, salt was essential not only for seasoning but also for preserving meats, fish and other foods. Presumably Jesus' disciples, several of whom were fishermen, would have been familiar with this use of salt.

One of the many interesting theories in Kurlansky's book revolved around the Latin word *salarium*, from which we get our English word *salary*. Apparently this etymology is rooted in the fact that some part of a Roman soldier's pay was based on salt. Some people say they were actually paid in salt, a valuable commodity at the time. Others say that they were paid an allowance to purchase the salt to supplement their meal rations. This connection survives in our saying that someone is "worth his salt."

This gives us some insight into Jesus' words in the Gospel. For most of us, our salary is not directly connected to our faith. But the work that we do takes up a great deal of our time and energy. And in fact we are called to bring our faith into the workplace.

How we do that will vary according to our personalities and the work that we do. But this is our calling.

Jesus warns his followers that if salt

loses its flavor, it is worthless. One of the things Scripture scholars tell us about this passage is that while salt can't lose its "saltiness," it can become so diluted by impurities that it can no longer be used.

We've all known times when we become so overwhelmed by the day-to-day grind of our lives that life itself seems to lose its savor. Not only can we not be salt and light for others, we can't even find anything in our own lives to perk us up. It is perhaps at these times that Jesus' words strike a chord deep within us.

All of these things make this a rich metaphor for our lives as Christians, as followers of Jesus, as those who are called to be light and salt for our world. We can think about how our faith adds spice and flavor to our lives and the lives of those around us. And we know that when we let our spiritual lives get diluted and contaminated by too many other things, we lose touch with the faith that saves us.

If we find ourselves in a peak moment when we hear Jesus' words as a clarion call to bring his presence to the world, then we know what we need to do. But if we're feeling less than bright and salty, we need to find ways to return to the source of our faith. We need to ask ourselves whether we're taking our faith for granted like it's common table salt. †

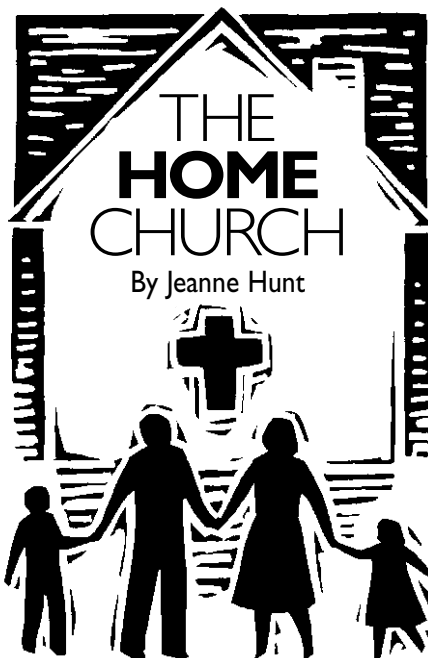

Without a little attention the spice cupboard loses its tang and the lamp in the corner has a burned-out bulb. When our families forget to liven up our faith and we succumb to a routine of one hour on Sunday, our energy and passion for living the Catholic faith fades just like the salt and light in today's Gospel.

So, what can we do to enliven our faith these winter days? The rest of today's Gospel gives the clue: Do not hide your light, do not let your salt go flat. Enliven the boredom of your faith life these winter months by sprinkling the menu of your daily life with activities, readings, prayers, or even pilgrimages that will spice up your response to Christ's call. Let the light of Jesus' teaching shine into the gray areas of your family's life.

Ask your children to name the spices they know and tell you how they taste. Now ask what spiritual spices can be added to family life. Turn out all the lights and then strike a match to demonstrate how much light a tiny flame brings to the darkness. Together think of occasions when each member of the family could strike a spiritual match and shed light into the dark and difficult times of another's life.



In today's First Reading, the prophet Isaiah tells us, "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own."


This is a common theme in the writings of the Hebrew prophets and it's at the heart of the gospel message. Jesus tells his followers to be the light of the world. Isaiah tells the people that when they care for the poor, their light "will break forth like the dawn." We can't miss the connection.

In our affluent society, few among us can claim to truly lack the necessities of life—food, clothing, shelter. God's repeated requests that we share what we have with those less fortunate should not seem like one more demand on our few resources.

And it is not just for the benefit of the hungry that we're asked to share—it's for our own as well. We can more easily rejoice in our own simple possessions when we know that we are not enjoying excess while others suffer want. What God asks of us is what's best for all.
